

# Free Clinical Trial: Could Your Cat Have Arthritis?

Study design: Researchers at NC State are evaluating the efficacy of a long term non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drug (NSAID) for treatment of chronic musculo-skeletal disorder (CMSD), including arthritis, in cats. Cats will be



treated with placebo and/or investigational NSAID for 8 weeks total.

# Patient eligibility:

- Adult indoor-only cats (≥ 1year of age)
- Noted by owner to be "slowing down" or have "mobility impairment" or already have a diagnosis of arthritis
- · No suspected or uncontrolled diseases

# Study benefits and incentives:

- Free physical, orthopedic, and neurologic exams (x2)
- Free labwork (including T4 level) and urinalysis (x2)
- Free radiographs

# Fall 2014



The North Carolina Association of Veterinary Technicians is a non-profit organization designed to support the veterinary technician profession. It began as a small group of dedicated veterinary medical technicians in the Wake County area in the early 1980s. The number of members grew to 62 in 1987 and became the North Carolina Association of Veterinary Technicians. In 1992-93, officers of the NCAVT were instrumental in helping Bill 747 pass in the NC General Assembly. The bill essentially kept the North Carolina Veterinary Practice Act from becoming open to individuals who had not graduated from an AVMA accredited program of veterinary medical technology and successfully completed the National Veterinary Technician Exam and State Boards.
